Jewish Holidays


Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, is one of the two High Holidays that arrive each fall. The other is Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement. Rosh Hashanah is generally a time of spiritual reflection and prayer. There are apples and challah bread dipped in honey in the hopes of having a "sweet" new year, one that is filled with love, happiness, joy, and celebration. A special horn called a shofar is blown. Yom Kippur is considered to be the holiest day of the year for the Jewish people. It is a soleman day with no working, eating, or drinking. Often Jews spend the day in synagogue in order to feel closer to God and to ask repentance for one's sins. For those who celebrate you can wish them a "meaningful holiday" or say "L'Shana Tova" (Happy new year!).

New College Opportunity for Students with Autism and IDD

On July 28, 2022 Massachusetts became the first state in the nation to open college opportunities to students with Autism and IDD. This law known as; "Inclusive Concurrent Enrollment 4," grants students with Autism and IDD access to higher education. Students will be allowed to "participate in undergraduate academic courses, internships, work-based training's, extracurricular activities and all other aspects of campus life." Under this new law, students will not be required to take standardized tests/aptitude tests, have a high school diploma, meet high school course requirements, meet a minimum grade point average, or have a passing score on the statewide assessment test used for acceptance." Massachusetts colleges and the department of higher education will be working on establishing "guidelines to ensure participating individuals select courses that are appropriate to their individual strengths, needs, preferences and interests."
