

ADHD Awareness Month!


October is Attention Deficit


Navigating ASD

Safety Guide

With everyone back in school and new routines established – we want to be sure to bring attention to our Safety Guide. Safety Tip of the Month!

Falls are the leading cause of injury under the age of 5, but all children/young adults with autism are at risk for falling. The Boston Public Health Commission has a program called the "Window Falls Prevention" program. This program makes window guards affordable to families in Boston but they are also available to support families outside of Boston. The window guards are removable and have an emergency-release mechanism. It is recommended that window guards are installed for families living on the 2nd story or above and have a family member at risk for falling from a window. Some additional safety tips to help prevent falling:

- * A child can fall out of a window with as little as 2 inches of clearance.
- * Don't substitute window quards for screens. Screens are meant to keep bugs out, not children in.
- * Lock all unopened doors and windows.
- * Open windows from the top instead of the bottom.

DDS Autism Waiver Open Enrollment

What's Happening?



It's that time of year again, where the Department of Developmental Services (DDS) Autism Waiver Service Program (AWP) will be accepting applications! The Autism Division at DDS runs the Autism Waiver Program that provides "Expanded Habilitation" and Education (intensive in-home services and supports) as well as related support services such as community integration activities and respite.

Services are provided by trained clinical staff and are available for a total of three years. At the end of three years, the child may access supplemental services that meet the child's needs and help with the transition out of the intensive Autism Waiver Program until the child's 9th birthday.

Who Can Apply?

- Child must have a confirmed Autism Spectrum Disorder diagnosis, subject to verification by DDS
- Child is between ages 0-8 years old and has not reached his/her 9th birthday
- Child is a resident of Massachusetts
- Child meets the level of care required for services in an Intermediate Care Facility for persons with an Intellectual Disability (ICF/ID) as assessed by DDS
- The family chooses to have the child receive services in the home and community
- The child must be able to be safely served in the community
- The child must have a legally responsible representative able to direct the services and supports of the Waiver
- The child must be found by the MassHealth agency to be eligible for MassHealth Standard coverage, based on family income
- For families who have not yet applied for MassHealth, this must be done at the time of the filing of the Waiver Program Request Form
- Child has a Social Security Number

Translations

Autism Waiver Program Open Request Application 2020 Translations are offered in multiple languages such as Arabic, Burmese, Cape Verdean Creole, Chinese-Cantonese, Chinese-Mandarin, Haitian Creole, Khmer, Portuguese, Spanish, Vietnamese, Nepali, and Somali. Translation and interpretation are available free of charge to all participants.
